



Gardening in Desert Places

If you have ever traveled to the present-day state of Israel in the Middle East during the later half of the 20th Century or the twenty-first Century, you would see an amazing site called a "Kibbutz." The Kibbutzim (plural for Kibbutz) is a community farm that has reclaimed much of the former desert and turned it into a virtual lush paradise. For over a thousand years, this area of former Palestine has been a virtual wasteland or what much of <u>The Bible</u> calls a wilderness. The Prophet Isaiah describes this environmental transformation in the thirty-fifth chapter of his book when he says:

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus, it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God." - Isaiah 35:1-2

This summer of 2017 makes Florida feel much like a desert when it doesn't rain very much like a "dry land". However, many of us still like to keep beautiful yards and maintain gardens. I'm the latter. While I don't particularly like doing yard work, I do love gardening. And this summer, we're growing lots of okra, greens, and green beans. I guess in this heat, that's about all you can grow here. But when you add water and the right fertilizer, God seems to make our "desert …blossom abundantly [and we therefore] rejoice with joy and singing" over the beauty of God's creation around us.

The present area around First U. M. Church of Titusville is very similar to this wilderness area. To be blunt, there are problems with certain people in the streets around us. If let go, downtown would become a desert area. HOWEVER, I still believe in the power of the Spirit of Jesus to transform a "dry land" into a place where "the crocus…blossom abundantly and …[we] shall [eventually] see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God" through Christ to make downtown beautiful once again.

There are signs of this "springtime in the desert" already around First, Church. We still reach out and help quite a few people in physical, spiritual, and emotional need. God sends us fellow laborers to help us out in these fields. Our Friday Food Pantry serves an average of 80 persons a week. Our Saturday Community Breakfast has served over 28,000 breakfasts in these last five years. Now we are renting to a new public Charter School which will have over 200 students on our campus from Monday until Friday each week starting in the first week of August. I don't know about you, but renting our Education, Youth, and Trinity Classroom Buildings to a new start up public elementary school seems a bit scary to me. Yet isn't <u>The Bible</u> filled with scary stories like floods, lions, wars, famine, sickness, death, and even things I can't repeat. However, if you keep reading, most of these tales usually have a happy ending all because someone had faith in our Lord to see them through the time of trial.

After 32 years of being in the U.M. Christian Ministry, I prefer to garden in the desert. The work may be more difficult than in other places but the fruit is sweeter.

Therefore, may this and every issue of our Messenger newsletter serve as your invitation to join us in Christ's garden that at times may seem to be on dry land which, however, provides better produce than others.

So, will you join us in being a "gardener in the desert?"



The 19th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States was adopted on August 18, 1920 and provides men and women with equal voting rights. The amendment states that the right of citizens to vote "shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." Although this equality was implied in the 14th Amendment (1868), most of the states continued to restrict or prohibit women's suffrage.



Did you know...

- 1. that Elizabeth Cady Stanton was the mother of seven children? Susan B. Anthony would baby-sit Stanton's children while Stanton wrote suffrage speeches and petitions that Anthony would deliver.
- 2. that one of Elizabeth Cady Staton's daughters, Harriot Stanton Blatch, also became an important leader in the suffrage movement?
- 3. that many early suffrage supporters, including Susan B. Anthony, remained single because, in the early 1800s, married women could not own property in their own right and could not make legal contracts on their own behalf?
- 4. that in the early 1800s, in most states, women could not have custody of their own children? According to state laws, children "belonged" to the husband. Not until the 1840s, when women began to organize to obtain legal rights and gradually laws began to change, could women own property in their own right after marriage, or obtain custody of their own children.
- 5. that there is a difference between the terms "suffragist" and "suffragette?" In the United States, supporters of woman suffrage preferred and used the term suffragist. In Britain, militant supporters of woman suffrage called themselves suffragettes. When the American press, or those who opposed woman suffrage, called an American woman a suffragette, it was intended to be derogatory.
- 6. that actor Katharine Hepburn's mother was a prominent suffrage supporter from Connecticut?
- 7. that American women who were jailed for demonstrating for the right to vote were force-fed in prison when they went on hunger strikes?
- 8. that women were the first protest group in US history to picket the White House? Since then, this tactic has been used by many groups to protest for rights.
- 9. that Alice Paul, leader of the National Woman's Party, was put in solitary confinement in the mental ward of the prison as a way to "break" her will and to undermine her credibility with the public?
- 10. that suffragist Inez Milholland was the first woman to have a memorial service for her held in the United States Capitol?
- 11. that the nineteenth amendment to the Constitution granting women the vote was passed by only one vote? Tennessee was the 36th state to ratify the Amendment, and it passed the legislature when Harry Burn, a young legislator, changed his vote to "yes" after receiving a letter from his mother telling him to "do the right thing."
- 12. the women's suffrage movement had its roots in the abolition movement? Most supporters of women's rights were introduced to reform efforts through the abolition movement of the 1830s, many of them as members of the American Anti-Slavery Society (AASS) led by William Lloyd Garrison.



Please Do Not Park in front of Ed. Building on Palm Ave


